<b>PRINCIPALS REPORT</b>	<p>Anita:</p> <p>We have been given a couple of grants this year: \$425 for gardening which we will use for a new garden shed. Kids sport also gave us a grant which we can use to hire before school sports for kids. In past years it has been a Claremont student, she is now filling in as supervisor at PL so she is doing some activities before and after those shifts. We will also be using the extra money for more badminton and other sports equipment from that grant.</p> <p>2021/2022 school year: same number of kids (273 kids and 13 divisions)</p> <p>Grade 2 and 3 skipping club is also going really well; student teacher who is involved in Island Hoppers, Tuesdays and Thursday.</p> <p>May 25<sup>th</sup> the virtual book fair starts hosted by Russell books, order through Russell books, from link, you can also buy books right from store let them know from PL. through website delivered to PL.</p>

School bus registration is out so don't forget to register your student if they will need transportation for this coming school year.

Please also let us know if your student will not be coming back to PL for the upcoming year so we can use the accurate number for class planning.

Transition has also started for the grade 5 students heading to Royal Oak and other middle schools.

School supplies: trying something different this year where parents/guardian's can pay a lump sum and teachers will purchase (\$42) bulk supplies. Newsletter will come out in June. Money by June 25<sup>th</sup>. Note: parents can still purchase their own supplies

Funding request:

Was given a MAKEDO grant, linked to skills Canada to carpentry.

The kids are made of high-quality plastic screws and tools that the students can use to create things like a soccer pitch, houses, robots, etc. Started in district through a program Darcy McNee brought forward. High school students have access to wood working, metal work. Middle school student has been given the opportunity to create things through 3D printers. These kits have been purchased to help kids in elementary school develop hands on skills. The kids can be used with math, kids have to think about how you put walls together and how to create doors. The kids really love them, obsessed with them! This type of learning also speaks to the ADST curriculum and covers core competencies like responsibility, communication and critical thinking.

<p>TREASURER'S REPORT</p>	<p>See attached: updated as of today.</p> <p>Have around 40k in the account right now so could think about spending extra money still.  Do we have a minimum amount to keep on hand?  No mandated minimum but what we have done over past number of year, is to have what we need in the account for next years budget, so if we didn't do any fundraising we could cover that year.  Trying to reduce that overage but due to last year we didn't spend much and this year didn't spend much either.  Fundraisers were good this year, about next years' worth of expenditures in the account.  Does the revenue fluctuate? has been going back and forth but would need to go back over the numbers.  Does PL school view this as an extension of the operating budget?  No, this money is used for "bonus" things that they ask for; extra teachers supply, those kinds of things. The items typically change over the years but we try to stay around the same amount of money as spent in years past. Try to stay consistent.  The school does not consider this money as a part of their budget.</p>

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Welcome to the May Confederation Of Parents Advisory Council of Saanich's (COPACS) report.

At each monthly meeting, we are fortunate to have the Superintendent, members from the Saanich School District and the Board of Trustees join us and present updates and new information, along with members from other PACs and guest speakers.

Superintendent Dave Eberwein provided us with his monthly update...

1. 2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR: The Province is expecting a normal opening to the upcoming school year. SD63 is going on the assumption that the school year will be back to normal as there is no additional COVID funding for next year at this time.
2. DISTRICT SURVEY: Thank you to everyone that took part in the district survey - the survey which focused on the current school year, things we liked, changes we would like to see, where we want to go, etc. There was an extremely high response; close to 4,000 responses from 900 respondents! The largest group of respondents were parents. The survey responses are being reviewed and the findings will be presented at the SD63 Board meeting next month as well as at the COPACS June meeting.

COPACS Vice-President's Report – Liz Keating and Kim Woodcock

- SIDES (the South Island Distance Education School) might be switching over to an online learning system from their current distance education program; new name POSP – Provincial Online Service Program
  - o The Province wants to thin down the 50 school districts offering distance systems
  - o Currently 85% of the students in SIDES are from outside of our school district
  - o SIDES provides services to students K-12 as well as adults coming back to finish their high school education.
  - o SIDES provides an educational option for students and families who don't fit the traditional brick-and-mortar building mold
  - o With COVID, numbers at SIDES went from a couple hundred students into just over 1,000

Other News...

Food Insecurity Working Group

- There is a small group in SD63 working together to bring awareness and promote the need in our community and school system regarding food insecurity.
- The group is hoping to approach and bring on the CRD for assistance
- Two local SD63 schools, Brentwood Elementary and Bayside Middle schools, receive daily drop off from the Peninsula Food Bank. The items they receive are used for their "Forgotten Lunch Program."
